Each Commandment tells us something about the importance of our relationship with God and our moral responsibility towards one another. I hope you find this short series helpful.

# The Message of the 8th Commandment "Respecting the truth."

In the world of morality, sometimes what is not said is more important than what is said. The 8th Commandment, "You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor", includes the sins of lying, deception, hypocrisy, and slander. But the heart of the Commandment isn't about forbidding certain acts – it is about being a person of integrity who respects and lives the truth.

As human beings we are naturally motivated to tell the truth, and we have to be motivated to tell a lie. Some lie to cover up a wrongdoing, some lie to avoid punishment, others lie to make themselves appear to be more important. Well-meaning people sometimes lie to avoid confronting someone else with an unpleasant truth. No matter what the motivation, to tell a lie is still a sin.

The 8th Commandment requires us to always respect the reputation of others. Spreading a negative rumor about someone never serves any good purpose. Though a bit of gossip may be true, when we pass on that information without a reason, we injure someone's reputation and we call that a sin of detraction, because it detracts from that person's good name. If you pass on or create a rumor of story that is not true, you are "bearing false witness against your neighbor", an even more serious sin which is called calumny, or slander.

Today we are all called to respect another person's confidentiality. Counselors, therapists, priests and doctors must not reveal what you tell them in confidence, except in unusual cases when keeping the secret might cause serious harm to you or someone else. Private information that could lead to prejudice against a person is confidential, unless a serious reason exists to tell it. It is, however, morally correct to reveal confidential information when a person is in danger of causing serious harm to him or herself or someone else, as in the case of a possible suicide. The only place where a persons secrets are completely safe is in the Sacrament of Penance, where a priest can never tell anyone what he has heard, even in the most serious circumstances.

Finally, it is also important that our society tell the truth in advertising, in news reporting in the press and in politics. We all have to make daily choices about truthfulness. When you are a person of integrity, telling the truth is your strength – a good habit that will serve you well. Jesus said, "If you continue in my Word, you are truly my disciples; and you will know that truth, and the truth will make you free." (John 8:31)

#### Fruits of the Holy Spirit

#### Question:

I've heard that gratitude is a fruit of the Holy Spirit. What does that mean?

#### Answer:

In St. Paul's letter to the Galatians, he talks about the "fruits of the Holy Spirit." He is referencing an idea that Jesus talks about frequently in the Gospels. "By their fruits you will know them" (Matthew 7:16). He uses the example of a plant. If the plant is healthy, it will bear good fruit. If the plant is unhealthy, it will bear rotten fruit or none at all. Jesus echoes this idea at the Last Supper, when he says that if we remain close to him we will "bear much fruit" (John 15:8). If we allow the Holy Spirit to work in our lives, we will bear the fruits of the Spirit!

Technically, gratitude is not one of the fruits St. Paul lists. "The fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control" (Galatians 5:22-23). But doesn't that sound like the response of a grateful heart? When we're grateful, we experience a sense of joy and peace that makes it easier to love. We can be kind, patient, generous, and gentle with others rather than possessive or competitive. When we're grateful, we don't need to grasp at what we don't have. We practice self-control. Gratitude helps us to be faithful, knowing God will always be with us. Sounds like good fruit to me!

# Congratulations Knights of Columbus 2024 International Community Program Award Winner

Pope Pius XII Council 5295 - Narragansett, Rhode Island

Our very own Knights of Columbus recently received the 2024 International Community Program Award for their mission work at Jacob's Ladder in Jamaica. Past Grand Knight Cliff Tyler and his wife Patricia were invited to Quebec, Canada to receive the award on behalf of the council.





#### Jacob's Ladder, Men on a Mission

Council 5295 established a partnership with Jacob's Ladder, an orphanage in Jamaica, to help care for children and adults with developmental and physical disabilities. Council members take annual mission trips to the facility, helping with construction and repair projects, participating in spiritual activities, such as Mass and daily prayer, and organizing recreational activities for residents.

They organized the shipment of seven 40-foot shipping containers to the facility, containing adult diapers, clothing and other goods, valued at over \$200,000. The council has also helped to replace the roof, paint the facility, and provide plumbing services. Additionally, with support from other donors, they provided water heaters, washing machines, golf carts for transportation around the grounds, and an aquaponics system to the facility. Overall, the value of support from the council is nearly \$500,000, and their service to the facility's residents continues today, with planning for new projects already underway.

One such project is fundraising for 30 additional solar hot water systems for Jacob's Ladder. They've already funded 6 systems that were installed earlier this year. For additional information, visit www.popepiusxii.org. Their next trip to Jacob's Ladder is scheduled for November. 2024.




