



St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara Founder of Carmelites of Mary Immaculate

This week I am happy to introduce CMI Congregation and its founder, St. Kuriakose Elias Chavara (pronounced St. CHA-VA-RA), whose feast is celebrated annually on January 3rd. You may have noticed these three letters: C.M.I. after my name. This is the short form of my congregation: Carmelites of Mary Immaculate, which was started under the leadership of St. Chavara who was a diocesan priest from Kerala India (1805-1871). He was canonized on 23 November 2014 in Rome by Pope Francis.

Saint Chavara was born on 10th Feb, 1805 in a village Kinakary, Kerala India surrounded by back waters and lakes. He joined the seminary at a young age of 12 and became ordained a priest at the age of 29. To lead a more radical and holy life, he asked

permission from the bishop to start a religious order for men (Carmelites of Mary Immaculate). On December 8, 1855 he made the religious profession along with other 10 companions. He died on January 3rd, 1871 in the odour of sanctity, leaving behind the high reputation of a very holy monk.

St. Chavara also started a congregation for women (Congregation of Mother Carmel, C.M.C.), which has more than 4,000 sisters serving in education, hospitals, orphanages and nursing homes. While he was Vicar General of the Diocese, St. Chavara became the pioneer of popular education in India, and the one who inspired the Catholics to start schools in every parish along with their churches like our Catholic schools here in USA. Today the CMI congregation is running 110 high schools, 113 middle schools, 10 professional colleges, 3 engineering colleges, 10 hospitals, one medical college and the Christ University in Bangalore, the only Catholic University in India.

Amidst his diverse and manifold activities, he wrote books on spirituality and popular devotion. His counsels to Christian families given in the form of a "Testament of a Loving Father" are universally applicable and are relevant to this day. Amidst his several religious and social activities, he remained essentially a man of prayer and intense charity, staying in close communion with the Lord, permeating his spirituality to all around him, and was accepted and referred to as a man of God, from his early years. His mortal relics are



kept in our mother house of the Congregation at Mannanam in Kerala India, where thousands of pilgrims visit the Tomb of St. Chavara in search of his intercession and blessing.

CMI congregation is a vibrant religious order with contemplation and activity. It has 2004 priests (24 more will be ordained this year), 9 bishops having mission dioceses in north India, 604 Seminarians and 130 Novices in different stages of formation to become priests and in 43 countries as missionaries. There are 94 CMI's working in the US and Canada doing ministries in parishes, hospitals, universities, prisons, and mission to the Syro-Malabar Catholics.


St. Chavara Feast at St. Thomas More



The shepherds went in haste to Bethlehem and found

MARY AND JOSEPH, AND THE INFANT LYING IN THE MANGER.

Luke 2:16

SHALOM

A Hebrew word that many people are familiar with is *shalom*, commonly translated into English as "peace." However, the word is much richer, deeper, and broader than that. As a matter of fact, when the blessing in today's first reading concludes with shalom, it serves as a summary of the entire blessing: *shalom* is God's wholeness, well-being, longevity, harmony, as well as God's peace. Perhaps Mary prayed this blessing while she found herself in the midst of angels, shepherds, and—quite likely, thanks to the shepherds—inquisitive neighbors who had been told of the wondrous birth. Perhaps she prayed for God's *shalom* not only for herself, but also for her child as she reflected on his birth. As we stand at the threshold of a new year, we can likewise pray this blessing, with Mary as our example, pondering the mysteries of Christ in our hearts, praying for the richness, depth, and breadth of God's *shalom*.

MARY THE CAREGIVER

At some point in time, most people will find themselves needing to watch over another person. This is true for parents and children of course; for others, perhaps an aging parent or spouse; a friend or neighbor living alone after surgery. At these times, along with the caregiving of the moment, there is often a focus on the future, a wondering about what will come. Quite naturally for the new mother Mary there is this future focus, with many possibilities for her to hold in her heart. She reflects quietly in the midst of the very hectic series of events that follow the birth of her child: hurrying shepherds who go and tell the wondrous news to others, then those others sharing their amazement. Luke tells us that Mary keeps all of this, and reflects on it in her heart. Mary is watching over Jesus as mothers do, watching over each and every moment.

GOD THE CAREGIVER

As Mary watches over her child, so did Israel pray for God to watch over them and one another, to bless and keep them, as Mary kept and reflected on things in her heart. Mary's face surely shone upon the infant Jesus, as Israel prayed for God's face to shine upon them with that graciousness we also know in her whom we call "full of grace." At the conclusion of the blessing in today's first reading is a prayer for God to look on us in kindness and, even more, to grant us peace. It may be in this final line of the blessing that we see God most at work in the face and the care of Mary, gazing gently

on her child, wishing the fullness of God's shalom for Jesus and his future. Our mission as disciples is to show the divine care we hear in the blessing prayer, and to live out the care-giving we see today in Mary.


