Catholic Schools Week – January 26 – February 1, 2025

As part of our discipleship, all of us who love Jesus are called to support Catholic Schools spiritually and financially during "Catholic Schools Week." We are blessed with the great privilege of the Church to provide a learning environment where our children are formed in the Gospel, deepen, or even meet Jesus at school, and learn the Catholic social teachings of the Church put into action.

Monsignor Clarke School, located in Wakefield, is a fine school that has experienced a resurgence in recent years. Their live Nativity, held in early December, demonstrates how a Catholic school can reach out to the broader community to witness the birth of Christ. The Prout School, Hendricken, Lasalle, and many other Catholic Schools in Rhode Island are essential beacons of light in our diocese.

Growing up, I attended both public and Catholic schools. I went to Woonsocket Middle School, which was, at the time, the largest middle school in Rhode Island. I didn't feel at home and asked my parents if I could attend a Catholic middle school. We met with our pastor, who offered to subsidize my tuition if I volunteered to answer the phone and greet people at the parish office. Once I did, I saw the "back story" of the life of a priest. Many would come to the office for food assistance, counseling, and search for help for other reasons. Before working in the office, I had no idea what the priest did outside of celebrating Mass. I was intrigued and wondered if this job planted the seed for my curiosity about the priesthood.

St. Thomas More has two annual collections to support parish families with children attending Catholic schools. Assistance is distributed based on need and is a great help to families. During my 10 years as chaplain at Hendricken, a scholarship was established to assist a student needing a full four-year scholarship. To this day, Hendricken continues to raise funds for this scholarship, and each year, I actively participate in selecting the recipient. It is arguably one of the most challenging and fulfilling tasks of my Priesthood.

Catholic schools are the focus of all of us. Offer a prayer today for all the faculty, staff, and volunteers who often do so much for less.

God bless our Catholic schools.

One of the most famous members of the Dominican Order, St. Thomas Aquinas (1225 – 1274) is well-known by many for his theological work, "The Summa Theologiae." Born in Italy, his mother wanted him to become a Benedictine and had high hopes that he would eventually become abbot of Monte Cassino, where he spent much of his youth. To change his vocation, she had him kidnapped by his brothers on his way to Paris at the age of 19. He spent two years in their captivity. Despite this, nothing could shake him from his vocation to become a Dominican priest and he was eventually released. Once free, he went to Paris and then to Cologne, where he finished his studies with Albert the Great.

His greatest contribution to the Catholic Church is his writings. The unity, harmony, and continuity of faith and reason, of revealed and

These Evil Days

"Alas, that these evil days should be mine."

If you've ever seen "The Lord of the Rings," you might recognize this quote from "The Two Towers." The words are spoken by King Theoden at the grave of his only son and heir, as Theoden contemplates the coming war for Middle Earth, a war which has already claimed the life of his son, a war he wants no part of, a war that seems utterly hopeless and unwinnable.

These evil days.

You don't have to be a fantasy enthusiast or even a Tolkien fan to identify with Theoden here. We have all experienced this same feeling of despair, perhaps increasingly in this age of technology and social media, when the ills of the whole world — violence, injustice, moral disorder and chaos — are in our faces, on our phones, looming over our days.

But when we despair like this, we forget an important truth: this is the time of fulfillment, and we are lucky enough to be living through it.

Yes, the world is broken. It was broken two thousand years ago, too, when Jesus stood up in the synagogue on the Sabbath and read the words of the prophet Isaiah: "He has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives...and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord."

Jesus didn't come to fix the brokenness of the world. He came to fix *our* brokenness. He offers us not relief from the trials of life, but an answer to the question of how to live in joy, in love and in purpose in the midst of these evil days.

Why do we do that? Catholic Life Explained

Question:

I've heard that love is a theological virtue. What does that mean?

Answer:

Charles Shultz, the creator of the Peanuts comics wrote, "/ love mankind ... it's people I can't stand!" This good humored comment gets at an important truth. St. John wrote a verv strong statement in one of his letters: "If anyone says 'I love God.' but hates his brother. he is a liar: for whoever does not love a brother whom he has seen cannot love God whom he has not seen" (1 John 4:20). How often do we say "I love the homeless," but ignore the parish food drive? Or insist on the importance of respecting others, but don't bother to say hello to our cashier? If we can't love an individual person, we might not love people like we think, and we certainly need to work on our love for God.


Love is "the theological virtue by which we love God above all things for His own sake, and our neighbor as ourselves for the love of God" (CCC 1822). God knows acts of love of Him and others isn't always easy. So He invites us to pray for the grace to do it. The virtue of love gives us the grace and strength we need to offer our lives to God and love people in our lives, especially those who are difficult to respect, tolerate, and care for. Real love, of course, is risky. Real love wills the good of the other when we just want good for ourselves. Real love gets up on the cross when we'd prefer to take a nap in Gethsemane. Real love changes things.
